FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR & PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

Dear Friend of MEND.

2023 was the busiest year we've ever experienced. Thanks to you, MEND's programs were able to keep up with the demand, and your neighbors were able to get the help they needed.

The Community Cupboard provided groceries and household items to a record number of individuals and families last year—985 households, compared to 642 in 2022. Serving so many people stretches our little food pantry to its max. With a dedicated team of staff and volunteers, and some creative storage solutions, we continue to be open six days a week, providing a wide selection of food to anyone in need.

Upper Valley MEND also provided more than triple the amount of financial assistance in 2023 compared to 2022. Our social worker met with two households on average every day we were open.

About one third of that financial assistance helped people pay bills related to keeping or finding stable housing—rent, mortgage, utilities, shelter, and transportation. In addition, Upper Valley MEND received a one-time grant in 2023 to pay medical bills for patients. This aid—which made up the other two-thirds of the financial assistance provided—mostly went toward dental bills. This exposed just how many people in our region are experiencing dental pain that they can't afford to fix.

While the need continues to grow in our community, so does the support. Thanks to donors and volunteers, Upper Valley MEND provided more than double the aid provided in 2022. This remarkable increase is made possible because of you.

BUILDING A STABLE FUTURE FOR THE UPPER VALLEY

Finding an affordable place to live in the Upper Valley has become harder and harder. Local businesses have worked hard to raise wages, but the cost of housing continues to be out of reach for many local workers.

Last year, MEND began quietly raising funds to start an affordable rental program for the local workforce. Thanks to early donations, the support of local and state governments, and seller financing, MEND was able to raise \$5.4 million and purchase 28 apartments at an affordable price from the Marson family. Three more are scheduled to close in the next month.

Thanks to this outpouring of support, as well as additional state funding just announced this year, the affordable rental program is closer than ever to being fully funded. In fact, MEND is now evaluating ways to expand the program, helping more local residents stay in our community. Mark your calendars for May 3, the date of the kick-off event for the program and campaign!


